I must say that JCC is a place not only for spiritual growth but also personal growth. As far as I can recall, JCC had a long history of having a shortage of musicians. I guess this was partly due to the financial situation of our parents. As a child, for whom paying school fees of \$1.50 was already a problem, learning music was a luxury reserved for those who could afford it. But dreams came true in JCC. When the youth worship service was formed, a void was created in the adult music ministry, as the core of musicians was formed by the youth. It was a problem, but problems also create opportunity.

A desperate recruitment attempt resulted in what we see today as "OJT Musicians". With our already aged organs and limbs, learning to play music on-the-job was as difficult as teaching my mother how to use the computer. It takes time. The situation however, presented an opportunity for people like me to learn to play some music. Sometimes, there were criticisms on our standard, but we were comforted that God looks at the heart. As long as we do our best to serve Him, whether in music or otherwise, He will be smiling on us from above.

There are many areas in various ministries that still lack workers and these create opportunities to learn and grow. As long as you are willing, God will make a way for you.

In my 19 years in JCC, it has been joyful to make many friends and even watch their children grow up. From babies learning to walk to today, when many are in tertiary education or doing National Service, we watch them grow week after week. My wife commented to a relative that we are closer to the children in the church than our relative's children as we see the children in the church much more often then our relative's children.

I must thank God for JCC and its group of very dedicated servants. Whatever storms they faced, they are still standing in JCC although it would be easier to pack up and leave. Truly, that's the kind of spirit that God demands.

My family and I have grown physically, morally and spiritually in the last 19 years. JCC has become like a big family to us and is the reason why we are still staying in the Jurong area. Moving away from the industrial air and loud aircraft noise was a consideration, but for the convenience of traveling to JCC, we decided to stay put.

Choon Lee had been readmitted into hospital, and has been there for about nine weeks to treat a wound which hasn't heal.



May the Lord bless and reward you.




JURONG CHRISTIAN CHURCH THE BUILDING 1967 - 2007

JCC Kindergarten's FOOD & FUN FOR FUNDS John Lee



A big "**Thank You**" is deserved by all supporters of the JCCK Family Day last month. We managed to raise \$13 000 with expenses of only several hundred dollars, much better than we did last year. This would not

have been possible if not for the many church members (in addition to parents of our kindergarten children and staff of the kindergarten) who have stepped forward to be counted among all who have a beating heart for the JCCK as an important ministry that reaches out to a significant segment of the community – little tots whose parents choose JCCK despite numerous other options of early childhood education in the neighbourhood.

As I researched the history of the church for her 40th anniversary celebration this month, I have also been glad to come to know more about the kindergarten. I realize that JCCK has a long history going back to the early years of the church. Our octogenarian brother, P. S. George, who was a founding member of the church, gave testimony to this fact in the recent oral history recording made by Pastor Samuel Wang. Bro. George said:

"Actually the children centre was started by the YWCA, they had no place to build in Jurong, so they made use of our place. But when they had their own place, they left all the children's furniture and all these things behind and they went off. So we thought that maybe it was better to start a children centre of our own. That's how we started.

"I think, the children centre was already going on soon after the dedication of the church building, then they (YWCA) withdrew after one or two years. And at that time I was the Treasurer of the children centre and I was Treasurer for about 6 years."

So our kindergarten has a history going back to the 1960's. Right from the beginning, the church has been a life-force to the operation of the kindergarten. It was, and is, and will be for members of the congregation to see the importance of supporting the work of the pre-school education ministry in providing an educational service with the infusion of Christian values. Where we have been imperfect, or have fallen short, we should always in unity (between the church and the kindergarten) seek to better ourselves instead of being discouraged. The way church members have rallied to make the Family Day a great success is very encouraging. Brothers and sisters in Christ have dug into their own pockets very

generously to set up the funfair

stalls to make the occasion enjoyable to young and old who came to spend their funfair coupons. Helpers took precious time off from their personal activities to man the stalls. Supporters also provided free loans of equipment; free donation of

heavy games equipment; free donation of helium gas and balloons, prizes, food, goods for sale ... the list goes on. This explains why we were able to run the Family Day with such a sizeable collection but a low expenditure. On the day itself, we

even sold close to \$1000 of coupons. Praise be to God!

In a confused moment during the early period when the children's centre (as JCCK was then known) was in its infancy, there was some quibble over funding matters. The fact that the church should be supporting the children's centre and not

the other way round was firmly established by Rev. Choong Chee Pang when he was assisting in the church's Chinese section, when we were without a Chinese pastor. This is the oral-history recollection of Bro. P. S. George. To say that the pre-school ministry

would not be standing from the 1960's until now if not for the vision of the church to take over from YWCA (instead of just letting it go quietly) and the consistent sustenance by God's grace working



through the big-hearted congregational backing cannot be more accurate. The single-minded espousal of the church to have the ministry, to develop it, to grow it and not let it fall is the buttress that secures our survival in good times and hard times. Yes, we have had joys and sorrows, but when did we ever say 'die' or call it quit in service to the Lord? Mdm Chan Yoke Lin, a long-serving faithful teacher in JCCK shared something poignantly. Here is a translation from her sharing in Chinese:

"29 years is a long period of time, with all sorts of joy and sorrow, with God's hand leading us through it all. At different times, the Lord raises different managements (the governing committees); blessing them with wisdom, intellect and vision to employ varying methods to take care of the kindergarten. Besides, we are also blessed with different principals at different points of time. They all bring with them different personalities. different backgrounds. different perspectives and management styles. However, I believe that it is by God's will. Give thanks to the Lord!

"We know that wherever the Lord's name is lifted up, His grace is manifest. Now, the Lord has placed more and greater visions (with His grace) in our surroundings – new houses keep appearing in our Jurong area. God wants us to do more, do greater things and do better. Give thanks to the Lord!"

Indeed, God wants us to do more, not less, and we can do so only if members of the church continue to rally for the ministry to ride through thick and thin. In service to the Lord, do we never have gains to be thankful for, even if not all gains are readily visible? As an example, our present parish worker, Ms Saw Peh Ern, was a

little girl who went through the doors of JCCK in the 1980's. At that time, she didn't know the Lord; nevertheless, the seed was sown well even if it did not sprout instantaneously for all to see. How many people in the church have the privilege of being there in the field of the Lord's harvest, battling the trials and tribulations and yet remain strong and steady in God's unassuming service? Isn't it great for us to have the opportunity to hear from these

privileged humble servants' own mouth to have a feel

of what keep them going despite rough rides from time to time? Here is the reflection we should not miss, the reflection of none other than Grace Tuang, our JCC faithful member and dedicated teacher of JCCK for many years:



"Jesus said, "Let the little child come to me ..." (Matthew: 19:14)

"Jurong Christian Church has been a channel God uses to bring His Gospel to numerous children in Jurong. Seeds of God's love are sown in their little hearts while they receive their Preschool Education at JCCK. The greatest joy is to see parents of these children come to worship and serve the Lord in JCC.

"I joined JCCK in year 1989. It's my privilege to witness the growth and development of God's work in the lives of the children in the last 18 years. Thank God for the opportunity to be part of the work here. He has granted me strength, wisdom and confidence to help and nurture children.

"My most memorable year was 2002. There was a child who had cerebral palsy, was bound to a wheelchair and could only mobilize his right hand. Despite his shortcomings, he was an encouraging child to us. He was a cheerful and enthusiastic boy and his presence brought

much joy and harmony to the class. It was a real-life lesson of practising love and care, accepting one another in accord with Bible teaching. The class also displayed such a loving scene to the parents and guests at the Graduation cum Concert. It brought surprise and warmth to all our hearts. Praise God! Only in Him can I experience such joy in serving the children."

It warms the heart to come across testimonies from time to time of grown-ups who remember how JCCK had been a memorable and beneficial part of their growing-up years. Rev. Warren Lau, in his book "A Heavenly Vision" (1993, LCMS, pg 113) said that "although the ecumenical aspect [of JCC] was terminated, it was nevertheless a bold step and gave a glimpse of what was possible for the church that is

concerned first for mission and not for denomination." Concerning what was possible, he went on to say,

> "In 1991, they [the church] undertook a major renovation to the sanctuary costing \$246 000, of which about \$85 000 came from a loan from DGM on a five-4% interest year. arrangement, \$45 000 came from a two-year interest-free loan from their kindergarten, and \$30 000 was an outright grant from the kindergarten."

As I chew on the words of Rev. Warren Lau, I realize that it can also be said that the bold step of the church in taking over the children's centre from YWCA enjoined with a trusty, win-win. collaborative. hand-in-glove, synergistic bond between the church and the kindergarten has given us a glimpse of what is possible for us all as brothers and sisters in Christ if we are all concerned first for mission. putting faith in God in dealing with secondary issues as they arise.

I hear an idea from the principal of JCCK that next year we shall try something different from a funfair and I believe that it can be something more exciting. Well, the idea is still raw, so members of the church who love JCCK (I assume all do) can come forward to offer their suggestions of different ideas to cook to produce an aroma. JCCK is, after all, a significant ministry of the church like other ministries - it belongs to us all, and each and every one of us has a part to play to overcome challenges in the current tough pre-school environment to make the kindergarten stand tall above our challengers!

Kurt Kusserow

elected Bishop of the Southwestern Pennyslvania Synod of ELCA

CHICAGO (ELCA) -- The Rev. Kurt F. Kusserow, St. Paul Lutheran Church, Latrobe (Trauger), Pa., was elected June 15 to a six-year term as bishop of the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

Kusserow, 43, will succeed the Rev. Donald J. McCoid. McCoid, 63. Kusserow will assume the role of bishop on Sept. 1. He will be installed Oct. 20 at Calvary Episcopal Church, Pittsburgh.

Born in Shelby, Ohio, Kusserow is the son of parents who were missionaries in the former Lutheran Church in America. In 1966 the family moved to Malaysia, and they lived in Lenggong and Ipoh. In Singapore they lived in Jurong, where Kusserow's father served as one of two pastors of Jurong Christian Church. Kusserow graduated from Singapore American School in 1981.

After returning to the United States, Kusserow attended Thiel College, where he received a bachelor's degree in English in 1985. In 1989 he received a master of divinity degree from Trinity Lutheran Seminary, Columbus, Ohio, one of eight ELCA seminaries.

Kusserow was ordained in 1989. He was pastor of the Westmoreland Unit of Town and Country Lutheran Ministry, serving Faith Lutheran Church, Apollo (Oklahoma Boro), Pa., and Hebron Lutheran Church, Avonmore, Pa. before he became pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church in 1997.

"If there is one thing that I have learned in the few years I have been a pastor it is that there is never, ever a congregation where the pastor can do everything. In fact, the reality is that the pastor does only a small part of what takes place there," he said.

He is pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Mount Pleasant, where "the people are the ones who do the ministry. I watch and marvel and rejoice at what they do," he said.

2nd Cambodia Mission Trip

*In Khmer, that's "God loves you" and He loves the Cambodians too. Cambodia has gone through over thirty years of war. Up to 2 million people died of starvation and overwork, bombings or were executed under the communist Khmer Rouge regime, Vietnamese invasion as well as the country's political infighting. This trip has opened my eyes to the reality of the atrocities done to humankind. The visit to Choeung Ek, one of the many killing fields, will remain etched in my mind: the myriad of bones and scraps of clothes of those killed. A Cambodian lady I met still harbours hatred for the Khmer Rouge as all these happened to her. I was in

my teens safe and secured in Singapore, oblivious of all these happenings in Cambodia. Cambodians are just beginning to recover and have the peaceful life taken for granted by us.

It is so beautiful to experience a group of us, about 20 over people, consisting of Lutherans, Methodists, Baptists & Presbyterian, bonding and working together as brothers and sisters in Christ for the sole purpose of sharing God's love and blessing

the people in Kampong Thom and Kampong Chhnang.

The YAM (Young Adults Ministry) decided that as far as possible to go for mission trips this year. So Peh Ern, Wong Mui, Beng Lay, Wilfred and I started the ball rolling with the rest of the CG members intending to go in June. It was some time after I signed up that it dawned on me about the reality of the trip. With trepidation, I checked with Beng Lay if we were going to stay in huts and what the living conditions will be. Peh Ping (she was actually the first YAM representative who went in December last year) was consulted and we were

reassured that we will stay in air-conditioned comfort in hotels. Hey we were supposed to go on a mission trip not holidays, I was reminded! I read somewhere that it is better to have sacrificed oneself than to have merely served. Service comes from slaves, sacrifice from sons. We are after all sons and daughters of our Father. Not that our time there was such a big sacrifice compared to the persecution presently faced by our fellow members in the family of faith elsewhere in the world.



It was tougher for me personally as I have difficulties sleeping in new environments. There were many sleepless nights (maybe 3 to 4 hours max of sleep), so you can imagine my relief when we could stay for more than one night at the same place. The weather was not the most conducive (about 38°C) but do note that the month we were there, April, is the hottest month in a year. However, all these are not important when you realise and

> experience that sense of fulfillment that you have done something that pleasing to our Father in heaven.

I would like to challenge my family in Christ in JCC to not only have a pilgrim mindset but a mission mindset as well. We are called not only to walk in the Lord but also to "GO" and share the gospel,

be it to the people around us or further away. The experience is all the more gratifying when you know that you are doing your part as God's child. As mission trippers, we may not be able to do much but what we can do is bring some happiness and share our blessings to the people there. Whilst we were in Cambodia to bless, we in turn were ministered and our souls refreshed.

THE CHRISTIAN LIFE - A PROBLEM BASED LIFE

Several years ago, a preacher from out-of-state accepted a call to a church in Houston, Texas. Some weeks after he arrived, he had an opportunity to ride the bus from his home to the downtown area.

When he sat down, he discovered that the driver had accidentally given him a quarter too much in change. As he considered what to do, he thought to himself, "You'd better give the quarter back. It would be wrong to keep it." Then he thought, "Oh, forget it, it's only a quarter. Who would worry about this little amount anyway, and the bus company gets too much fare already; they will never miss it. Accept it as a gift from God and keep quiet." When his stop came, he paused momentarily at the door, then he handed the quarter to the driver and said, "Here, you gave me too much change." The driver, with a smile, replied, "Aren't you the new preacher in town? I have been thinking a lot lately about going somewhere to worship. I just wanted to see what you would do if I gave you too much change. I'll see you at church on Sunday."

When the preacher stepped off of the bus, he literally grabbed the nearest light pole, held on, and said, "Oh God, I almost sold your Son for a quarter." Our lives are the only Bible some people will ever read.

This is a really scary example of how much people watch us as Christians and will put us to the test! Always be on guard -- and - remember -- You carry the name of Christ on your shoulders when you call yourself "Christian." How many people have you turned away from Christ because of your character?

The above story is a stark reminder of a real truth about how people are constantly benchmarking Christians against a certain measurement of their own perception of what a Christian standard is. I remember many situations when my colleagues asked me to join them in playing 4D or TOTO. However, should I have accepted their invitation, they would probably turn around and say, "Aren't you a Christian, can you play 4D?"

This can be verified when I took an illegal U-turn while driving with my colleagues and one of them said, "Hey, you are Christian, yet you break the law." However, it was he who suggested I take the turn. Isn't that how the Devil works? He tempts us then he accuses us.

We preach to our family, friends and colleagues about our faith in Christ. You can be sure of one thing, they will want to test your faith. For instance, Christians are supposed to trust Christ for our daily bread. What your friends will expect of you is that you give them all your money, if you truly believe that Christ will provide all your needs. Have you experienced that?

Perhaps your boss may ask you to tell a white lie that he is not in office so as to avoid meeting up with certain creditors. Have you wondered whether he is actually assessing your trustworthiness as an employee? What if he asked you about your colleagues? If you answer truly you would be seen as a "sabor" king, a telltale. However, your boss may be expecting that you as a Christian would be telling only the truth. What would you do?

As an accountant, have you to "beautify" the accounts? Do you know that your boss may appreciate it but the Inland Revenue will put you in jail?

Everyday and in every way, you may be tested. Pray for wisdom and pray that you will not be tested. It boils down to this, we have to walk the talk.


