Although not as newsworthy as En Bloc sales, the movement to repeal section 377A of the penal code is slowly but surely gaining momentum. 377A is the section of the Penal Code which prohibits "gross indecency" between men, in other words, which criminalises homosexual acts. Nominated MP, Siew Kum Hong will be sponsoring a petition in Parliament calling for the repeal of section 377A of the Penal Code.

If history repeats itself, then we must learn from the history of San Francisco. The homosexual community in San Francisco developed at the end of World War II, when thousands of military personnel returned to the United States via San Francisco. A substantial number of those men were homosexual and decided to stay in the city.

The emphasis in the gay movement shifted abruptly in the 1980s, when the AIDS epidemic struck the community. The hedonistic lifestyle changed as the seriousness of the epidemic sank in and the number of deaths increased. Political efforts by gays have shifted away from enfranchisement and toward demands for

social services and research money to deal with the AIDS crisis.

San Francisco experienced a sharp rise in early syphilis between 1999 and 2002, with the number of cases rising from 44 to 494 per year. Rates continued to rise through 2004. Since 1999, most syphilis cases have been among men who identified as gay or bisexual, and were infected with HIV.

Proponents have tried to relate same sex marriage with inter-racial marriage. Some claim that infidelity between husband and wife challenge family values more than same sex marriages. Are they comparing apples with apples or are they just trying to muddy the waters so that we do not see clearly?

are hoping more children will join. After lessons, we have games, or the children will either read children books about Jesus, and we show them video cartoons relating to the gospel. My co-worker, Pha Noi will sit and chat with the parents while lessons are going on. Please pray there will be opportunities to share Christ with them.

### **Ministry to our HIV church members in Ladprao**

We have 2 church members who have the HIV virus. Both are positive about life and are taking their medicines regularly. Khaen is still undergoing therapy with the Finnish missionary in Ladprao. But there have been a lot of changes in Khaen now. She is much better and has put on weight. She does not hear the 'voices' speaking to her so often now and if she does, she ignores it. Ladprao church has taken the initiative to help Khaen start a small business as a food vendor near her place. We hope this will help her ease her family burden and to start her life anew. Please continue to pray for Khaen.

One of our church member, Wikorn, was involved in a serious car accident 2 Sundays ago while driving back home at 5 in the morning. His car overturned a couple of times and Wikorn had to be extracted from the wreck by cutting off parts of the car. Although the car is beyond repair, we thank God that Wikorn is safe. He is still in hospital but out of ICU. Pray for full recovery as there is still a bump in his head. The doctor has advised that Wikorn needs to be spoken to everyday to help him recover his memory.

### **Ministry in Mukdahan**

I had the opportunity together with the Lutheran Diakonia to visit Mukdahan prison in the Northeast. We have a Lutheran church in Mukdahan and Ajarn Sim, the pastor in charge had started a prison ministry there. We did ministry to the women inmates although a couple of old men were allowed to join the women. Most of them are doing life-term due to drug peddling across the border with Laos. We also did a seminar on Aids prevention, as HIV is on the rise in Mukdahan. Being very close to the Laos border, Mukdahan is projected to be the next big city. Apart from that, we had an evangelistic meeting and the Word of God was shared powerfully to them. All of the inmates accepted the forgiveness of sins from Jesus Christ.


### **Upcoming Events:**


# Swansea Updates by Molly

## **Dead? You still have to pay library fine**

HARRISON, N.Y. - Even the dead apparently have to pay the fines on their overdue books at one Westchester County library. Elizabeth Schaper said she was charged a 50-cent late fee while turning in a book that her late mother had checked out of a Harrison Public Library branch.

*Schaper said she returned the book last week, and was stunned when the man behind the library counter told her of the 50-cent fee. "I told him that maybe he didn't hear me right, that my mother had just died, otherwise I'm sure that she would have returned it on time," Schaper said. "His only reply was that, 'That will be 50 cents.'"*

*"Schaper said a couple days after the incident another library employee called to apologize and offered to return the fine she had paid."*

Probably the library staff could not be faulted for insisting on the 50 cents. He was just doing his duty in following the rules, lest his superiors held him to account when they themselves risked being held to account by audit for a fine shortfall. As comedian Jack Neo would have said, "Law by law."

The way human brains think can lead to a rather amusing outcome. If you owe me 50 cents, no matter what, I have to claim it from you. It is just right to do so; it is A MATTER OF PRINCIPLE, if not a matter of accountability to audit. We know that a negative audit report can be a serious matter. Woe betides the financial staff if accounts are not up to scratch to the last cent. So better be on the safe side.

If Ms Shaper did not pay up, would the following scenario play out?

- 1) *The staff keys into the system against the customer record this sum of 50 cents as account receivable. He breathes easy after duty carried out.*
- 2) *With the passage of time, this record slips deeper and deeper into the recesses of the system, well nigh forgotten until a financial audit digs it out. By that time, years have gone by.*
- 3) *By recommendation (or order) of the audit, the library sends a reminder at the cost of postage, paper, labour, computer processing expense, etc.*

4) *The debtor never responds, so another round of reminder is sent, at a repeat of the above recovery cost. Maybe this time, out of kindness or frustration and eager to close the case, the creditor decides to elicit some response with a little diplomacy, by telling the debtor that she may appeal if not happy.*

5) *Finally, after all the to-ing and fro-ing, the library gets zilch in return because, after throwing good money chasing bad money, it decides to be magnanimous in closing the case with these nice words, “In consideration of your appeal and of your long years of loyalty to the library, we are very pleased, despite our unnecessary costs incurred, including the cost of producing and sending you this reply, to grant your appeal. Do pay us a visit soon.”*

*Alternatively, the creditor decides to sue Ms Schaper or the estate of her deceased mother. After incurring legal expenses of \$20 000, it still does not get back the 50 cents because of the Statutory Limitation on debt recovery timeframe.*

6) *In the next audit, the serious and highly principled auditor asks, “Have you accounted for all the outstanding fines?” The top officials of the library reply, “Yes, we tried very hard, sparing no time, effort and money to chase after the debts due to us. It is all in the accounts books the money we have spent in the process and the cases we have closed. All our debtors have been cleared, but we ourselves are in the red.”*

LAUGHTER IS THE BEST MEDICINE, so have a hearty laugh at the ridiculous outcome of a so-called “principled action”. Of course, for the sake of laughter, I hope that nobody will mind that I have allowed myself some licence for a generous dose of exaggeration in the above “possible” scenario. Maybe an extreme scenario like this is really possible if we consider the real outrageous case *Pearson v. Custom Cleaners* in Washington earlier this year of an administrative law judge in the District of Columbia suing the Korean owners of a dry cleaner for US\$65 million as compensation for a pair of lost pants, not including millions more in punitive damages and attorney fees. Laughably, even a learned person can conceive a foolish “principled action”. (Or was it unprincipled?)

## Financial Stewardship – Buying Annuity



"I want to live indefinitely. I don't want to die," said the world's oldest man at age 112, Tomoji Tanabe.

It is possible that Tanabe may live more years. Not only that, he is looking forward to it and he believes that he can. It is a contrast to Singaporeans who prefer to occupy their minds with doubts that they would live past 85 years of age to benefit from the government's proposed compulsory annuity and have meaningful time still to enjoy past their retirement at age 65, an age up to which employers will be legally mandated to offer jobs to their employees.

Is the optimism of Tanabe worth our emulation, so that we see the merit of the proposed annuity catering to longevity need; or do we see the longevity statistics of Singaporeans as less impressive than that of Japan, a country with the largest population of centenarians, so we would rather have an earlier drawing down of our CPF money to enjoy before it is too late with our age not catching up?

Whether we are optimistic or pessimistic, we won't know for sure when the time will arrive for us to kick the bucket. A person deemed to be of poor health may be declined life insurance at standard risk. On the other hand, a life underwriter may be happy to issue a large policy to one with no bad medical history who is certified PES A (highest level of fitness suitable for all vocations) in the army. Unpredictably, the final outcome may be that the former ends up surviving the latter. This is a matter of common sense knowledge, the unpredictability being exactly the justification for buying insurance. **If we can be sure, we don't need to insure.**

**Statistics on longevity does not tell the whole truth of whether you will live to a certain age.** Any statistical forecast that a certain percentage of people will live past 85 years, say, is just that – a fallible forecast. It is a generalization based on the data of the past to give us an educated guess of the future. Actually, mere numerical data is not the only factor we have to consider regarding the reliability of the statistics. It may be that the data is encouraging or discouraging, giving us high or low hope of long life. However, for the period that the data was gathered, the conditions affecting life (level of healthcare, changing state of air pollution, prevalence of diseases, socio-economic status of the population, etc.) may not be the same for the future period of relevance. So how old the population will grow can be better or worse than what the statistics implies.

With or without the statistics to help us, we don't know a lot of things about the future. There is no such thing as a crystal ball that can help. **Against the uncertainty, an annuity gives us the certainty that we will have a livelihood no matter how long we live.**

Remember the prodigal son in the Gospel story? He was impatient to get his hand on his inheritance fast to spend when it was not actually due for him to have (with his father still alive). Granted his wish, he was of course elated to have the sudden windfall to enjoy while he could. He did not calculate that he would outlive the wealth, which was soon depleted. As the saying goes, a fool and his money are soon parted.

None of us is a perfect fool, I suppose. We are all also not perfectly wise. Let's say that we are part-foolish-part-wise. The foolish part of us keeps urging us to spend, spend, spend ... to enjoy, enjoy, enjoy ... while we still have the breath to do so. With annuity, we can permit ourselves (within ethical limits) the foolishness to spend and enjoy as fast as we could deplete the cash in hand from the regular payouts. No worry that we would fall into the same predicament of being penniless like the prodigal son. This is because the wise part of us has planned for a guaranteed continual cash flow for life.

What if God decides to call us home much sooner than we can feel satisfied of having enough from our annuity? Well, it may also be that God

decides to call us home much later. Since it is a mystery to everyone when it is his/her time to go, it is fair for all who join the annuity pool, isn't it? In the event of an early farewell to this world, we can be contented that we are leaving behind a legacy of charity with the un-retained portion of our contribution going to benefit others who survive us. Doing charity is an expression of Christian love. On the other hand, should we miscalculate and underestimate our longevity because our human reasoning turns out to be at odds with God's will, we ourselves become the benefactors of the charity largesse of the annuitants who had "under-claimed" while they went home before us. (There were people expected to die early, yet they lived long; and people who planned to live long, yet died early.)

Purchasing an annuity is good financial stewardship. By foregoing the immediate gratification of a large wealth, one gets the assurance of receiving fixed regular payments throughout life. Some trade-offs between benefits and sacrifices are necessary for any financial investment. While it does not suit everybody, it should be relevant to most people. **Even wealthy parents who see no need to buy annuities for themselves may consider buying annuities as gifts for their children instead of passing to them a large one-off windfall like what the prodigal son received from his father. Apart from ensuring equitable and lasting legacy distribution between children, an annuity is also a very useful instrument for estate planning (to save on death duties).**

*Note:*

*In Singapore, the concept and value of annuity are still not very well appreciated. People who buy annuities tend to do so because of the CPF regulations on funds withdrawal rather than out of a desire for the unique benefits compared to other forms of investments. In America, annuities tied to charity giving (in cash or property) are quite common, dating back more than a century. One may even set up a gift annuity to benefit a church.*

# Tough Maths

**The Vine** is mainly for your Spiritual Formation, if I can use that phrase. However, sometimes we have to feed your mathematical hunger also. So here are the solutions to the tough PSLE maths questions:

## Question 1

Shop A has 156kg of rice. Shop B has 72kg of rice. After both shops sold an equal amount of rice, the ratio of rice that Shop A has to Shop B is 4:1. Find the amount of rice sold by the shops. (3 marks)

	Shop A	Shop B	Total
Originally	156kg	72kg	228kg
Sold	? (multiple of 4)	? (multiple of 4)	? (multiple of 8)
Final	4 units	1 unit	5 units (multiple of 5)

### Observations:

The final total must be a multiple of 5kg.

The amount sold by Shop A must be multiple of 4 kg since the original qty and final total for this shop are each a multiple of 4. The amount sold by Shop B is the same; i.e., multiple of 4. Therefore, the total amount sold by both shops must be a multiple of 8 since it is the same for each.

### Solution:

Try reducing the total 228kg in multiples of 8 so that the final total will be a multiple of 5. Only the first 4 cases below need be considered. **Note that the trial figures of 8, 48, 88 ... are quickly arrived at by noting that the ending digit needs to be 8 in order for the result to end with digit 0**, making it a multiple of 5 as required. In this problem, there is no way we can subtract a multiple of 8 to yield a result ending with digit 5.

$$228 - 8 = 220 \text{ (}\Rightarrow \text{ each shop sells 4 kg.)}$$

$$228 - 48 = 180$$

$$228 - 88 = 140 \text{ (}\Rightarrow \text{ each shop sells 44 kg)}$$

$$228 - 128 = 100$$

$$228 - 208 = 20 \text{ (Rejected since this means each shop sells 104 kg, which is obviously impossible for Shop B)}$$

The conclusion is that each shop sells 44 kg since this is the only possibility for the final stocks to be in ratio 4:1.

**Answer: 44 kg**

### Comments:

Although the explanation above seems to be tedious, it is normally not required for the PSLE candidate to explain in such detail and in so many words. However, a number of concepts are involved and understanding them to such a degree and in combination as required to crack the problem is not quite within the means of the average student.

This problem can actually be solved very easily in a few short steps by Secondary School students using algebraic equation. However, Primary School curriculum does not equip the students to handle it that way.

## Question 2

6/14 of the chairs in a hall are in rows of 13. Half of the chairs are in rows of 7. There are 112 more chairs in rows of 7. The rest of the chairs are stacked up. Find the total number of chairs. (5 marks)

*Solution:*

6/14 of the chairs are in rows of 13.

7/14 of the chairs are in rows of 7.

The rest of the chairs = 1/14 of the chairs.

Also,  $7/14 - 6/14 = 1/14$

\* 1/14 of the chairs = 112 chairs.

Total number of chairs =  $14 \times 112 = \mathbf{1568 \text{ chairs}}$

*Comments:*

Compared to Question 1, this question carries 5 marks but is relatively much simpler. However, there is a trick. The row numbers 13 and 7 are not relevant to the solution and many PSLE candidates may be 'deceived' into spending lots of time figuring out where to apply these two numbers since they are inclined to think that 5 marks can't possibly be for such a simple solution.

## Question 3

Tank A is filled with water to its brim. Water is then poured from Tank A to Tank B until both share the same height. What is this height? (4 marks)

*Solution:*

Note that the width of the 2 tanks = 40 cm.

The 2 tanks can be pushed together so their contents water can be seen as one single rectangular block with length  $50 + 70 = 120$  cm and width = 40 cm.

The combined volume in the 2 tanks =  $120 \times 40 \times$  common height of water

Volume of full tank A =  $50 \text{ cm} \times 40 \text{ cm} \times 60 \text{ cm}$


$120 \times 40 \times$  common height of water =  $50 \times 40 \times 60$

\* common height of water =  $\frac{50 \times 40 \times 60}{120 \times 40} = 25 \text{ cm}$

*Comments:*

Note that the final division can be done by cancellation to save a lot of time. It is unnecessary to separately multiply out the numerator and the denominator.

**In case you are wondering if Editor Martin or John worked out these answers, let me assure you that Martin is not good with figures. He is not a numbers person. Editor John Lee who also works as a private tutor came up with the solutions for this year's PSLE tough maths problems.**
