Did you know that Easter is such a big event in India? I didn't know until my colleague from southern India greeted me, "Happy Easter" on Thursday evening as I was leaving the office. He is a Hindu of the Brahmin caste, one of the highest, and also a vegetarian, although he drinks beer, which after all is made of "vegetables" or so he claims.

He told me that in India, the Christians celebrate Easter with some special cakes, which I presume would be hot cross buns. I also presumed that they go around distributing it because my colleague asked me what I will bring to office on Monday. I decided that I should bring some chocolate Easter eggs because I don't find hot cross buns in the neighbourhood confectionery.

Then on Good Friday afternoon around 5:00 pm, the doorbell rang and there at the doorway was Debra, home for the Easter holidays. It was a great shock to us as we were not expecting to see her until December when we go over to Brisbane to witness her graduation and to bring her back. In her luggage was one pack of hot cross buns all the way from Australia. Now I am trying to connect the dots..... Why did my Indian colleague ask what I would bring to office to celebrate Easter? Why did I presume that he was referring to hot cross buns? Why did God deliver the hot cross buns all the way from Australia? Do I bring some of the buns to office? How do I use the buns to tell the Good News?

I began to search the Internet for some clues but I was surprised to find that Jewish people do not celebrate birthdays. To them birthdays are of pagan origin and the Bible only mention birthday celebrations of Pharaoh and Herod but no mention of birthday celebrations of Moses, Solomon or Jesus. 
Z to bless. In fact, if you care to look around, there are enough of success stories of people who failed to be great scorers in their academic studies but turned out to be great performers in life.

THE STORY OF A FOOLISH CATERPILLAR – PUTTING GOD TO THE TEST

Caterpillar tempts frog to eat him

You can watch a YouTube video on this by googling for it.

Jigme (which is Tibetan for "fearless") was a caterpillar who lived up to the



meaning of his name. He had been frequently warned by his butterfly parents to be wary of frogs, because frogs are evil. They are connected with the plagues which fell on the land of Egypt (Exodus 8:2-14; Psalms 78:45; 105:30), and they are mentioned as a symbol of evil spirits in Revelation 16:13.

After the cautionary words, mother butterfly gave some words of

encouragement to the young caterpillar, "My dear Jigme, Heed your parents' words. Don't give cause for the frogs to devour you. Be good, and **God will take care of you.** You are a caterpillar today; soon, you will be a butterfly. God makes all things beautiful in His time (Ecc. 3:11), and He will make you beautiful."

Tragically for the willful caterpillar, he only remembered the words "God will take care of you" and quickly ignored the counsel about staying clear of the evil frogs. One day, on his daily walk in the warm sunshine, Jigme saw a large frog resting under the shade of a few large leaves. He decided to show off his dancing skill, twisting his flexible body lithely at some distance. The frog stayed put, not moving and not showing any interest. Seeing this, Jigme was not satisfied. He decided to move closer to the frog to show off his dancing skill, again to be ignored by the silent and unmoving frog. Jigme felt he had enough of the frog's cold-shouldering of his dance performance. With "fearless" in his name, he decided to poke his head on the frog's body, even so daringly as to tickle the frog's lips. At first, the frog simply felt irritated and so lowered its head to give the caterpillar a hard no-nonsense stare. When the caterpillar would not desist his unwelcome attempts to get a welcoming response, the frog decided, "Enough is enough with this annoying caterpillar." Finally, in one nippy move, the frog finished off Jigme in one gulp. Jigme lived up to the meaning of his name until that point, and he no longer lives to boast his courage to the world.

The butterfly parents appreciated God for creating them beautiful and providing them with rich manna in beautiful gardens where they also had useful jobs. They had hoped that their lovely (even if temporarily ugly) caterpillar child would grow up to be as promising and useful for their God-given roles in the gardens. Sadly, it turned out heartbreakingly all because of the child's disobedience and waywardness. The frog showed no active interest in the caterpillar, but the caterpillar kept inciting the frog to "come, come on …!" (*Watch the video*.)

Can we be like Jigme, the caterpillar?

The Bible says that the ancient serpent called the devil, or Satan, leads the whole world astray. (Rev. 12:9) The Gospels also detail how Jesus was tempted by Satan in the desert. I don't find anything in the Bible about people tempting Satan. It is the other way round.

Although the Bible does not explicitly caution us against tempting Satan, the Bible does warn us amply against falling into temptations. When people fall into first temptations out of curiosity, hubris or for any other reason, they become easy targets for Satan to aim further temptations to lead them deeper and deeper astray. This becomes like tempting the devil to tempt.

Even if we are not tempting Satan to tempt, we can be like the caterpillar, falling into the temptation of putting ourselves flagrantly in harm's way, sending ourselves "gamely" as a prey to a known predator. In other words, we can be so confident of the **"God will take care of you"** promise that we, at our own mortal risk, put the Lord to the test.

Do not put the Lord to the test

Imagine that you drive a car with high-quality airbags, solid frames and other top safety features. You feel safe, with the trustworthy car creator (manufacturer) having a supreme reputation for his safety promise to all drivers. Obviously, feeling safe and comfortable does not mean that drivers can abandon all good sense and thereby tempt incidents to put the car creator to the test on his faithfulness to his promise. As God's children, we have no fear with the assurance of Psalm 121:7, "The LORD will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life." (ESV) Nevertheless, Jesus has also reminded us in Luke 4:12, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." The reminder was of what Moses had commanded the sons of Israel in Deu. 6:16, "You shall not put the Lord your God to the test, as you tested Him at Massah."

What does putting the Lord to the test mean?

How did the Israelites test the Lord at Massah? God had led them to where they were by a merciful deliverance from Egypt. However, under the trial of hardship with no water to drink, they quarrelled with Moses and tested the Lord, saying, "Is the Lord among us, or not?" (Exodus 17:1-7) The tone of the questioning had the mark of telling God in the face, "You don't seem to be with us in our present situation!" (Note the exclamation mark.) Not only did they display contempt of God, they sought to compromise their trust in Him and they were ready to stone His servant, Moses. (v. 4)

Christians do not normally go to the extremes of testing out the Lord's promise of protection by venturing into radical and gratuitous adventures involving evil spirits or clear-cut vulnerability to extant danger. But, from the Massah happenings, we know that testing the Lord is not narrowly limited to this. It is broadly about an attitude of not trusting God, with challenging or intimidating for a wanted response for now and future or else ..., totally disregarding His kindness and blessings enjoyed in the past.

When we are in unsafe circumstances not by deliberate choice, then claiming the promise of God for protection is sensible. Consider this example:



You are a soldier assigned to be a sentry at a location where there are rumours that the place is creepy. Your brave character as a soldier manages to overcome any fear. After all, you tell yourself that you are there doing your duty and you have done nothing to ask to be intimidated by spooks. Besides, as a Christian, you boldly claim God's protection: "When I stand on the name of Jesus, who can stand before? In the mighty name of Jesus, we have the victory."

When people claiming God's protection gratuitously imperil themselves by premeditated exploits to prove God's presence with them, such as when they engage in haunted-house dares or spirit-channelling games, then it is "a testing of the Lord", which is an abomination.

When we are in pleasant circumstances in life, the giving of thanks to God and wishing for His grace to keep alive the blessings of a good time is a decent thing to do. When we become beset with troubles or trials, whereby we forget all the blessings of the past and start demanding God to show He is with us by granting us this favour for now and that for the future or else ..., it too is a "testing of the Lord" that is anathema.

Conclusion

We can be ugly like a hungry caterpillar who eats and eats, well-nourished to grow up into a great beauty to behold. We can eat and eat, hungry for spiritual truth, feeding on God's Word. Then we can shed whatever spiritual ugliness in our old self as the Spirit of God immerses in us and lead us into a metamorphosis – to become a new pretty creation. (The old has passed away; behold, the new has come.)

Of course, we cannot be like Jigme – the foolish, willful and disobedient one – who was fearless in the wrong way and paid the ultimate price for succumbing to the fatal temptation of putting **"God will take care of you"** to the test.

While enjoying fun and relaxation, there were also moments for me to do spiritual reflection. At the park where the bungee jump was, there was this thoughtprovoking fish profile, which looks very similar to the "Jesus fish" that we are familiar with. In the picture, the fish is right-facing because of my standing position. If the photo was shot from the opposite side, then the fish would be like the left-facing one adopted as a Christian

symbol. The Greek word for fish is a five-letter acronym for "JESUS CHRIST, GOD'S SON, SAVIOUR". The sight of this fish symbol stirs up memory of the fish and their symbolic meanings in the Gospels too, such as Jesus commissioning

His Apostles with the words "I will make you fishers of men" (Mark 1), and the Parable of Drawing in the Net (Matt. 13:47-52) which alludes to the final judgment.

It was the Lent season while we were in Korea. As the fish reminds of Jesus, the Lent season is also a reminder of Christ. South Korea is a country that practises freedom of religion. While walking in the busy thoroughfare, I saw a huge banner raised high up on a mobile frame. (See picture.) On another day, I saw someone walking with the banner to another



location in this shopping belt. (Will you see something like this in Singapore?⁽²⁾The message was loud and clear to both locals and tourists about the second-coming of Jesus.
