not have realized that this is not the original JCC that her grandfather served in way back in 1974. When Pastor Andrew asked how many people knew Rev Kusserow, only 4 persons raised their hands. They were

Roy, Juria, Freddie and Lissa. I believe Ronnie and Nancy would have raised their hands also if they had been around that Sunday.

This set my mind wondering. What if my grandchild visits NJCC 40 years down the road? Would there be anyone around who knew me? Most of my peers would be in Heaven by then. Only those who are in their twenties now would still be around. How many young people do I know? Certainly not many. So if I want to leave a legacy for my grandchild 40 years in the future, then I better get to know more young people now so that they will raise their hands 40 years from now and say, I knew Martin Cheah.



The Generation Gap makes each generation isolated. For example, with our Chinese Concert we are promoting a singer from the 60s named Pan Xiu Qiong who is unknown to our young people. This makes our target audience limited to the elderly only. So with only 16 days to go before the event, we are still unable to fill the hall on Friday night. If we had a K-Pop band, we would have filled the hall way back when we first mooted the idea but with only young people. So how do we get all the generations together? Is there something or someone everyone likes regardless of age?

When I look at the photo of the Abundance Cell Group at the bowling alley, I see the gap. It should be quite obvious. There are elderly, middle aged and very young people in the photo but the young adults are missing. When will the young adults grow to middle age and be part of the “adult” group?

When Jesus spoke to the crowds, were they of a particular age group? Some people would like to think so, especially those who do not believe in infant baptism. If that is the case, then how old was the young boy with the five loaves and two fishes? If we assumed he came alone then he must be quite fat because he could eat 5 fish burgers alone. The alternative is that since he was a young boy, he was there with his parents, that accounts for why he had 5 loaves with him.

There is a hymn with this verse:

In Christ there is no east or west
In him no south or north
But one great fellowship of love
Throughout the whole wide earth

The hymn writer imagined that distances and race do not keep Christians separated but one in a great fellowship of love. He probably did not realize that the generation gap could cause a division in the fellowship.

Do you know what the last verse of the Old Testament says? Malachi 4:6, “And he shall turn the heart of the fathers to the children, and the heart of the children to their fathers, lest I come and smite the earth with a curse.” Isn’t that beautiful? Of all the topics that God could have chosen to close-out the Old Testament, He chose to express His desire for family unity, specifically between children and their father. Fathers are under attack in America. All the hordes of Hell are out to get the father in a home. The reason why is because the father is the authority! The Generation Gap challenges parental authority, particularly that of fathers. – David J Stewart

Singapore General Election

The battle was fought. The winners in all constituencies were declared. The PAP won by a huge vote swing overall. Apart from the PAP and her supporters, another group of people must be jubilant in celebration of a windfall – the bookies, because many punters would have lost money due to the result they did not expect.

Election surprises are not uncommon. The victorious drink to celebrate success; the defeated drink to drown their disappointment. This is all very natural.

In my humble opinion, the winners fought a hard battle. They received their victory prize. The defeated candidates fought a clean and worthy campaign. They deserved the people's recognition for their effort in voicing up some major concerns of citizens. The winners must know humility, as pride goes before a fall. The defeated can keep their chins high, knowing that even though they did not have the result they desired, the part they contributed to a democratic election was positive.

I am often reminded of the saying, "Man proposes, God disposes." There are people who are happy to see things one way, against those who are unhappy. The latter see some other things positively while the former take negative positions. The conflict of opinions never dies off. When some conflicting positions get sorted out, others arise. What one expects, he doesn't get; what he doesn't expect, he gets. Although the victories in all constituencies in this election depended on human votes, I see another dimension of it – God's will that we cannot argue against.

We congratulate the PAP for her mandate to form the government. Isaiah 9:6 tells us that THE GOVERNMENT rests on Christ's shoulders. Here, I type in different fonts to make a distinction between "the government" and "THE GOVERNMENT". I see "THE GOVERNMENT" as meaning THE GOVERNMENT of the

world, the authority that rules over all, and not simply a government of any geographical part. Christ is the KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS (Rev. 19:16) and he is watching over all earthly governments. The good ones will stay with His blessings, and the bad ones will have their day of reckoning. This is very evident in the world.

Someone sent me a message in Chinese comparing two “types” of governments. Here is a translation:

“I think an ignorant, incompetent and complacent government is more terrible than a capricious and corrupt government.”

My mind surveyed the countries near and far. I don’t need to cite examples of countries with one or the other of these “types” of governments, but I can say that Singaporeans would not rest well if we have either of these.

Thankfully, we have a decent government. It would be grossly unfair to our hardworking leaders if I say that the government is bad. Indeed, the government’s ability to lead the nation through decades of peace, prosperity and stability is the envy of countries that are fraught with unrests and accusations of incompetence or corruption.

Yet, I would make myself unbelievable if I say that the government is so good that there is no room to do better to assuage the worries of a lot of citizens who have made their strong feelings heard. Yes, I say “heard” because I know that the government is working hard on the issues. Whether these worried citizens are in the majority or minority does not negate the fact that there is a sizeable number who feel disenfranchised by their experiences.

We are blessed to have a caring government; but a government of distinction is one we seek. Maybe the government is going to feel some pressure from this high expectation; but Singaporeans are known to have high expectations in a lot of things, to be No. 1 in rankings despite owning just a little red dot on the world map. Maybe, we can temper our expectations a little; but still we have the right to look forward to a government that is more than just being “good” – one that is very able to manage the aspirations of both the strong and weak, provide for the needs of both the well-heeled and the indigent, and forge a cohesive society where every stratum from the natural proletariats to the natural aristocrats recognize that they are interdependent in the scheme of things to move forward as ONE PEOPLE, ONE NATION, ONE SINGAPORE.

After GE 2015, we have a new cabinet. We have infusion of fresh blood in Parliament. There will be new ideas and new vitality for good governance of Singapore. One aspect for our leaders to take care of is the hurtfulness of

divisive politics that, to put it mildly, is distracting to the larger agenda for the people to move onward with peace and harmony, and in unity with the governing authority.

“TODAY reports: While the elections have brought out some differences among voters, Singaporeans must unite and work around their differences to take the country forward, says Social and Family Development Minister Tan Chuan-Jin.”¹

*We have a government who is neither blindfolded
Nor stopped in her ears.*

*She listens attentively to voices from the ground

What time is it?

It's time to crave for pure spiritual milk.



*“Therefore, rid yourselves of all **malice** and all **deceit**, **hypocrisy**, **envy**, and **slander** of every kind. Like new-born babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good.” (1 Pet. 2:1-3)*

New-born babies feed on nothing but milk. Without milk, they won't grow up healthily. Milk is also good for the matured – calcium for strong bones, protein for healthy muscles and many more health benefits. If physical milk is great for physical health, spiritual milk is great for spiritual health. Do you crave for pure spiritual milk as an infant craves for its mother's milk?

As milk gives us goodness, it takes away the badness, such as lowering high blood pressure and hence the risks of strokes, reducing the excessive production of cholesterol and reducing the risk of certain cancers. These are but some of the claims of the health benefits.

Similarly, pure spiritual milk can help us rid ourselves of the badness of our spiritual health, such as malice, deceit, hypocrisy, envy and slander of every kind.



Malice is a general term for all sorts of wickedness, including hatred, spite, meanness, cruelty and so forth. Often, the grievances in our heart give birth to malice, a desire to do other people in.




Deceit is used by wicked people. As a fisherman, Peter would have understood the imagery of baits and hooks used to achieve the aim of catching prey in the net. Deceit is a form of

dishonesty. The baits that deceitful people use are the pure lies, half-truths and tricks; and the hooks are the mischiefs that these evildoers want their targets to fall for.

Hypocrisy is like pious believers celebrating the holy day of the Passover with superficial saintliness while they keep the Festival with the old bread leavened with malice and wickedness instead of with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth. (1 Cor. 5:8)

The word “hypocrite” came from Greek with the original meaning of “stage actor” and the word “hypocrisy” carried the meaning of play-acting. Obviously, a stage-actor in play-acting is good in the art of pretense. I quote Matthew Henry Commentary:



“In civil conversation hypocrisy is counterfeit friendship, which is much practised by those who give high compliments, which they do not believe, make promises which they never intend to perform, or pretend friendship when mischief lies in their hearts.”

Oh, how mean hypocrites are, how much we detest them but ... wait ... do we pause to see the reflections in our mirrors and feel confidently assured that we pass the “no-hypocrisy” test with flying colours?



EnvyFace

Envy is what churches traditionally teach as one of the seven deadly sins (pride, greed, envy, wrath, lust, gluttony and sloth). To some, it is scary to contemplate the deadliness of these sins, but thank God “antidotes” are available to counteract them: humility neutralizes (is the antidote for) pride, generosity dissolves greed, love can overcome envy, kindness subdues wrath, self-control resists lust, temperance lightens gluttony and zeal quashes sloth.

Yes, love can overcome envy. It is not just loving others regardless of what they are, but also loving ourselves regardless of what we are. Envy rears its ugly head because we lack this “double love” – loving others and ourselves.


We compare upwards and feel a sinking feeling caused by our desires to measure up pressing down on us instead; and when we compare downwards, pride (another of the deadly sins) rears the other head which is actually an envy of self. Socrates said that envy is the ulcer of the soul. An ulcer can fester. Therefore, let us beware. Take love. Love brings positive feelings and banishes the negativity of envy.



Slander not, if you don't want to be called a fool. (Prov. 10:18) It is better to seal your lips than to loosen them and let others behold your foolishness. You don't have to be direct with false accusations against others to be guilty of slander. People can become slandered by your purveyance of incomplete truths, snide remarks, subtle words and deceptive body language.

Malice, deceit, hypocrisy, envy and slander are sins that Christians should be wary of. Can they be eradicated? If "antidotes" for the seven deadly sins are freely available (in the Word of God), surely it shouldn't be hard to find the "antidotes" for sins that are "less-deadly" because they are not traditionally classified in the deadly group. Sins of whatever descriptions are "all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent," and we should get rid of them by humbly accepting the Word planted in us, which can save us.

"... now that you have tasted that the Lord is good," it is time to crave for what is pure; i.e., pure spiritual milk – the pure and complete Word of God, not filtered or paraphrased for easy digestion, spiritual milk in its purest form.

Christians are like a Cigarette Box

I asked a colleague who smokes and he said that he is immune to the pictures on the cigarette box. Probably the spirit that God put in a man does not get immune to the message of the Gospel, so there is always a struggle and that annoys the person.

Thinking further, I presume the two religions which believe in reincarnation really do not need to tell people of the consequences because there are no consequences. They just come back and repeat their lives again and again until they get it right. So to most non-believers, Buddhism and Hinduism seem like a most peaceable religion and they do not start wars or conflicts, unlike Christianity and Islam. However, this is a fallacy because in India, there are many conflicts between Hindus and other religions. While in China, the Shaolin monks are one of the fiercest warriors. My brother then mentioned the Spanish Inquisition and other atrocities carried out by Christians, especially my mother's great, great (I don't know how many "greats") grandfather, who was Hong Xiuquan, who in the name of Christianity, chopped off the feet of women who had bound feet during the Taiping Rebellion. Yet I think that religion does not teach people to do evil but rather that people in the mistaken name of religion do evil to their fellow man.



So how do you defend against the Inquisitions, not just the Spanish but also the Portuguese and others, which was the next jab at me? Me: "Do you think someone who claims to be the literal brother of Jesus Christ could be a little nuts?"

He: "I guess he is a little nuts."

Me: "Then he did all the evil because he is nuts, not because he is Christian."

Well the above conversation did not happen. Instead, I just mentioned that Christians are also sinners and so they do sin.

May God grant us the words to speak when we are confounded.

They surely are very expensive affairs. Imagine the price-tag of each projectile that is exploded just to entertain the audience or warn imaginary potential enemies: "Don't play play with us!"

Recently, China put up a magnificent military parade of unprecedented scale, watched by many heads of state. Someone shared with me online a long digital picture scroll that was very beautifully made of the parade grounds. It was an impressive feast for the eyes –soldiers in smart formations and

weapons showcased in all their human glory. I was told to keep the picture as a precious collection. Instead of valuing the picture for keeps with eagerness, my mind wandered into the following thoughts.

Pardon me for my ignorance about international politics and power relationships. My small mind only thinks that big and powerful countries are most responsible for exacerbating the arms race. When one country shows off its military strength, surely another with the capabilities would not take it lying down. A battle of one-upmanship in equipping their fighting forces with greater offensive weapons in the name of defence can only exacerbate the arms race. Countries with strong militaries can be tempted to project hegemony in the world. At times, countries with modest means also face temptations to let their military ambitions take precedence over economic development and social care. The world does not seem capable of living in peace.

The picture scroll of military super-grandeur was awe-inspiring to me in another way – awe-inspiring at the humongous precious resources being expended on military ambitions, against an invisible backdrop of ordinary human beings in the world who are struggling over basic needs. Imagine how much each missile or each weapon can be converted to bread or rice to feed the hungry, and how much the brainpower of each military scientist or engineer can be converted to beneficially target solving the real survival problems of people in the world.

Wise Solomon said:

- Wisdom is better than strength. (Ecc. 9:16)
- Wisdom is better than weapons of war, but one sinner destroys much good. (Ecc. 9:18)



In this world dwell people who are intelligent with powerful brains and might. Unfortunately, the human race has much of its conscience of humanity lost.

Is the Bible a torch or a mirror?

(A study of James 1:22-25)

“Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says.”
– James 1:22

We read the Word of God. How do we apply it?

It is very easy to use the Word of God to chastise others for being unholy. The Bible then becomes like a torch that one holds in his hands. The torch is pointed at others, with all their flaws made abundantly clear in the light beam. “Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like someone who looks at his face in a mirror and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like.” – James 1:23-24

James tells that the Word of God is like a mirror, which reflects light onto the one who looks into it. So if we look into the Word, we see our flaws made abundantly clear in the reflected light.



Bible Mirror



The Bible as a mirror is for us to make use of for our own gain in self-reproof, to undertake self-improvement as we deal with our own lives. The Bible is not a torch for us to pick out the faults of others.

“But whoever looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues in it—not forgetting what they have heard, but doing it—they will be blessed in what they do.” – James 1:25

Unfortunately, many people much prefer the Bible as a torch rather than as a mirror. That is why many Christians have a “holier than thou attitude” when dealing with brethren. They switch on the Bible-torch and quickly point out the speck of sawdust in their brother’s eye, but they don’t look into the Bible-mirror to note the plank in their own eye. (Matt. 7:3)



It is easy to never forget how others look like when we shine the Bible-torch at them. In contrast, it is easy for us to forget how we look like in the Bible-mirror.
