In the fictional movie Saving Private Ryan, six men out of a platoon of 8, died trying to save Private Ryan. Near the end of the movie, the dying Captain Miller weakly mutters something.

Private Ryan: [leans in closer] What, sir?

Captain Miller: James, earn this... earn it.

In other words, Miller asked that Ryan continue to be a good man and worthy of all the men who had lost their lives to save his. Captain Miller had earlier in the movie said, half jokingly: He better be worth it. He better go home and cure a disease, or invent a longer-lasting light bulb.

Back in the present, the elderly veteran is revealed to be Ryan at Miller's grave. He asks his wife to confirm that he has led a good life and that he is a "good man," and thus

worthy of the sacrifice of

Miller and the others. He then salutes Miller's grave as the camera pans down the gravestones to a placid American flag and fades out as it shows the number of men who died during fighting in Normandy.

In another story, a true one, Thai boys rescued from deep inside a flooded cave in a dramatic mission had their heads shaved for a Buddhist ordination ceremony in honour of a diver who died during the operation.

The saga of the "Wild Boars" football team transfixed the world as divers worked to get them out of the Tham Luang cave where they spent up to 18 days.




Now eleven of the footballers are preparing to live as novice monks and stay in monasteries for nine days to "make merit" for former Thai Navy SEAL diver Saman Kunan, who died while installing oxygen tanks along the rescue route.

While Christians are not saved by good works, do we at least try to live a Christ-like life for his glory?

The Romans' Road to Salvation



The Bridge of Life is a very familiar model that Christians use to explain the Gospel. There is also on YouTube a fascinating one-minute illustration of the Gospel by folding and cutting a piece of paper. There are quite a number of other models that Christians use to share the Gospel

message to pre-believers. One of these is called the Romans' Road to Salvation, based entirely on Scripture verses taken from the Book of Romans. It is a method of witnessing to pre-believers by taking them systematically through the Word of God. The verses of Scripture all from a single Book are easy to mark down in the Bible for handy reference. Those with the inclination to memorise them may also do so.

There are various versions of it, each adopting more or fewer selections of the Romans' verses and in different orders. Whatever the variations, I realise that this is a good model not just for pre-believers to get the message. It is also

invaluable for those who have already known the Lord to refresh their minds and their hearts with the Good News as they journey along the Romans' Road hand in hand with the pre-believers.

Here, I have chosen the model with 7 verses in sequential order. In preparing to share this with you, I had to "recce" the route through the 7 stops myself. It has been a



spiritually profitable exploration of God's Word through the epistle of Apostle Paul to the Romans. Therefore, I recommend that you too take the challenge of this journey and be blessed yourself apart from blessing pre-believers that you may bring along.

1st checkpoint: Romans 3:10

"As it is written: 'There is no one righteous, not even one;'"

We begin our journey with the recognition that we are all sinners, without exception. In all honesty, hand on heart, can anyone say that he never commits any wrong against the voice of his conscience? What we do wrong affect others, and what others do wrong affect us, adversely. We are not just sinners, but very bad sinners as the strong words of Apostle Paul in verses 11 - 18 indicate:

- There is no one who seeks God.
- All have turned away from God.
- They have become worthless.

2nd checkpoint: Romans 3:23

"for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God,"

Those who criticise others think of themselves as good above criticisms. Similarly, others who criticise them think likewise. Romans 3:23 tells us unequivocally that absolutely no one is innocent. Hence, humans face a lot of troubles in the world because of themselves. We need help:

- We need to seek God.
- We need God's saving presence.
- We need to be made worthy with God's help

3rd checkpoint: Romans 5:8

But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

By the Cross, God demonstrates His love for us. While we turned away from God and become worthless, God has not abandoned us to ourselves. Christ did not die for good people; anyway, there is none who is good in the world. Christ died for sinners that you and I are. Why did God have to send His Son, Jesus Christ, to die for our sin? The answer is found at the next two checkpoints of our journey on the Romans' Road.

4th checkpoint: Romans 5:12

"Therefore, just as sin entered the world through one man, and death through sin, and in this way death came to all people, because all sinned _"

At the start of our journey on the Romans Road, we recognize the fact that we are sinners. Humans are under the clutches of sin because of one man - Adam - and the consequent price we must pay is death.

5th checkpoint: Romans 6:23

"For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

It is not difficult to grasp that one man's action of sin can result in a very bad outcome for others. It is also not far-fetched that one man's action of right-eousness can result in a very good outcome for others. In similitude, "just as sin reigned in death [because of one man, Adam], so also grace might reign through righteousness to bring eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 5:21) We received death through Adam's disobedience of God; we receive eternal salvation through the sacrifice of Christ on the Cross.

6th checkpoint: Romans 10:9

"If you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved."

The message of the previous checkpoints is clear. What is left is your determination:

- Do you confess that Jesus is Lord?
- Do you believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead?

7th checkpoint: Romans 10:13

"for, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

This is a reiteration of God's promise as declared by Prophet Joel in the OT (Joel 2:32). This is a guarantee to all who have faith in Jesus. This is Good News – the Salvation Christ brings! People cannot believe unless they hear.

"Paul argued that only a remnant of Israel ever believed (9:27–29). In rejecting Christ Israel was following a precedent already at work in earlier days. The Jews' zeal was commendable but nevertheless misguided. The only way of acceptance before God was faith in Christ and was (and is) within the reach of all. Those who believe in their heart and confess with their mouth "Jesus is Lord" will be saved. People cannot believe unless they can hear, and they cannot hear without a preacher. Though Israel heard, they still rejected God's message."

Concluding the journey

Have you heard? Do you believe? Will you call on the name of Jesus to save you from your sin?

Therefore, I began keeping a lookout for their concert dates in Singapore. Once their tickets were made available, I told Alvin and he booked the tickets, choosing the side of the stage, hoping to get the best possible view of Hillsong's drummers.

Alicia's experience

As expected, the crowd was made up of young people though we do see some of the older adults and an occasional

elderly couple as we went looking for our seats. The

younger band started the concert with unfamiliar disco-sounding songs to my ears but the younger crowd

seemed to know them well, jumping and singing (lyrics were all at the top of the gigantic screen on stage). Not everyone was like the youths though. Some of us continued sitting on our seats, enjoying the music and the atmosphere.

After an hour, there was intermission before a singer (Jonathon Douglass) from Hill-

When the main band came up after the intermission and began belting out familiar hits, some of those who were sitting started getting into the mood, standing up to sing, dance/jump and worship. I thought it was strategic having the younger band play to drain the energy of the younger audience so that when the main band came out with the slower songs, the lyrics of the songs would sink deeper in, drawing us into worship.

Alvin's experience

I have been looking forward to attend a Hillsong worship concert since starting to play drums in Jurong Christian Church. Other than attending this concert to worship God, my main intention is still to learn and improve the way I play for worship. Hence my sharing will be more musically inclined.

Very strong bass and kick drums. Hillsong sound engineers boosted the low frequencies of kick drums (lowest sound from the drums) that our body resonance with every beat. This creates a very personal experience with the music as you can literally "feel" the beats and rhythm. However, this cannot be implemented in our church setting due to many factors, of which I will mention only two.

One: Acceptance by the congregation, especially the elderly. Not because they are backward thinking or such but rather their hearts may not be able to take the excitement. As our body "feel" the beats, it will speed up our heartbeat as a natural response because the experience is not natural and is preparing to run or flee. It is precisely this bodily experience that the young would particularly enjoy.

Two: Budget. To create such audio experience requires expensive equipment and high technical skills of sound engineers.

With all that said, my take away to improve my worship as a drummer: to have strong and consistent kick drums (the lowest drum sound). This will help the congregation by giving them a rhythm to move their body to a beat, hence making worship a more personal experience.

Lessons Learnt:

I have learnt much from the speaker, from fellow retreat participants and from the events at the retreat.

Key things that I have learnt through the messages:

- Recognising that in seasons of transition, change can be rapid and situational; yet, transition can be an arduous process, bearing in mind the psychological impact beyond the changing circumstances.
- My husband and I also thanked God that the messages were very apt in helping us to reframe the current situation we might be going through (e.g., the test of submission, etc.) in being refined to become the person He has moulded us to be, in this season of transition.
- Through the messages, my husband and I have also learnt the importance of knowing what SPACE comprises (Spiritual gifts, Passion, Abilities, Character values & Experience) so that we may flourish spiritually and physically when we dwell in the SPACE God has called us to function in, particularly in our workplace.

Why a retreat is vital in the context of Cell Group:

A retreat allows us to extend our interaction to embrace brothers and sisters from the young adult ministry who are outside of our own cell group and enables us to bond with one another at a deeper level through fellowship, prayer and sharing of how the Word has spoken to us.



A retreat also allows us to have that platform whereby we could be intentional in building a deeper relationship with our own cell and discuss about things that we have heard from the messages that are very relevant and applicable to our life

stage.

I have been encouraged to encourage:


I have been much encouraged by the retreat experience and will strongly encourage people to participate in retreats. Even if they are not in any cell, the
