WHY ARE YOU A Singaporean/Christian /Lutheran?



Let's say you are a Singaporean. Do you ever ask yourself the questions on why you are Singaporean and why you stick to being a Singaporean instead of changing your nationality? To be sure, there are many things not great about being Singaporean if we give thoughts to the criticisms. Singaporeans are not perfect; yet, imperfections alone are not enough

reasons for us to change nationality.



Let's say you are a Christian. Do you ever ask yourself the questions on why you are a Christian and why you stick to being a Christian instead of leaving the church? To criticisms from non Christians

be sure, Christians receive a lot of criticisms from non-Christians.

No matter which group you belong to (whether regarding your nationality group or your distinctive Christian community), you are bound to hear opinions that are different from yours. This is to be expected. When you hear others' opinions, you may engage with the different opinions by sharing your thoughts in meaningful discourses. However, before you can do that, you must first have a position to stand on as a reference point. In other words, you must at least understand yourself. As a Singaporean, you must understand that there are negative labels put on you. You won't be easily swept away by such labels if you have a fuller appreciation of many positive labels

you do have. The same point applies to yourself as a Christian who knows why you are one. For example, quoting from a beautiful poem by Maya Angelou:

Am a Christian

When I say..."I am a Christian" I'm not shouting "I'm clean livin." I'm whispering "I was lost," Now I'm found and forgiven.

When I say..."I am a Christian" I don't speak of this with pride. I'm confessing that I stumble and need CHRIST to be my guide.

When I say ..."I am a Christian" I'm not trying to be strong. I'm professing that I am weak and need HIS strength to carry on.

When I say ..."I am a Christian" I'm not bragging of success. I'm admitting I have failed and need God to clean my mess.

When I say... "I am a Christian" I'm not claiming to be perfect, My flaws are far too visible, but God believes I'm worth it.

When I say..."I am a Christian" I still feel the sting of pain. I have my share of heartaches! So I call upon His name.

When I say..."I am a Christian" I'm not holier than thou, I'm just a simple sinner who received God's good grace, somehow. "When I say that I am a Christian, I am not shouting that 'I am clean living. I'm whispering 'I was lost but now I'm found and forgiven.'

It can be tragic if one makes a decision by taking in opinions without first being familiar with his own reason for being who he is.

As a Lutheran, I do not claim superiority over fellow brothers and sisters in Christ who are non-Lutherans. I trust the Lutheran Book of Concord not as a substitute for the Bible, but as a reliable reference source of the Reformation writings and the Christian creeds that came out of the ancient church – The Apostles' Creed, Nicene Creed and Athanasian Creed – for clarifying the Word of God against heresies, stating clearly the truth based on Scripture.

As a member of the LCS, I claim myself to belong to an evangelical church; i.e., while bearing the Lutheran traditions, the church I belong to subscribes fully to the teaching of the Gospel and believes in the infallibility of the Bible. While variations of opinions in interpretations

over some parts of Scripture are unavoidable, the differences do not reach down to the fundamental tenets of the Christian faith; therefore, evangelical churches are able to maintain the spirit of unity in the body of Christ and brothers and sisters of different denominational distinctives are able to maintain harmony in relationships.

Imagine that, as a Christian, someone from outside my faith circle comes to me and tell me all sorts of things that are negative, such as the fact about Christians being sinners and hypocrites, that Christian leaders are scandal-prone, that Christians are intolerant, etc. It is alright for me to hear them out and with humility to acknowledge the shortcomings of Christians and human church leaders. However, it would be grave if I do not bother to dig into a deep understanding of why I am a Christian and allow myself to be rocked in my faith by the accusations. In fact, as a Christian knowing my position of faith, recognizing my own fallibility but trusting in the infallibility of Scripture, I welcome criticisms – not to be swayed out of my faith but for their value in keeping me on my toes about my Christian testimony.

A student accepts his teachers' supplementary material as reliable



illumination of the contents of a textbook even though the student may have his first choice to refer to the textbook directly if he can understand the textbook presentation of knowledge. By this analogy, the Book of Concord is like a collection of illuminating material based on the teachings in the main source (the Bible), helping us to understand

the truth although Christians who can have understanding by direct reference to the Bible is not discouraged from doing so. Advocating the Reformation writings in congruence with the Bible teachings serves a good purpose in that the former would ease us into absorbing what is expounded in Scripture.

I am first a Christian; and second, a Lutheran. There is no contradiction between the two.

I have friends who are first a Christian; and second, a Methodist (or of some other Christian tradition) with their own ecumenical documents

that are good for their references to complement their direct reading of the Bible. Interestingly, according to Encyclopaedia Britannica:

"Nicene Creed, also called Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed, [is] a Christian statement of faith that is the only ecumenical creed because <u>it is accepted as authoritative</u> by the Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, Anglican, and major Protestant churches. The Apostles' and Athanasian creeds are accepted by some but not all of these churches."

Singapore is fortunate to be a place where there is religious and cosmopolitan harmony. If you are a Singaporean, you must know why you are a Singaporean. If you are a Christian, you must know why you are a Christian. If you are a Christian belonging to any of the denominational distinctives, you must know why and have a good understanding of the position you stand on; so that you can have meaningful sharing of views about distinctives among brothers and sisters if it interests you to do so.

It would be undesirable if you are a Lutheran but do not know why, and then when you are approached with assorted ideas external to your Lutheran tradition, you just become perplexed.

REMINSCENCE OF THE PAST & LOOK TO THE FUTURE



One of my cousins and I decided to contact our family members and relatives from my mother's side together for the Chinese New Year. It has been years since we have met with our uncles, aunties and cousins due to our busy schedules and the humdrum of coping with our lives and families.

Calls were made. My heart sank when my auntie shared that my 4th uncle has not been able to get out of the house for the last few years due to diabetes. He is wheel-chair bound and has to be cared for. They had to decline our invitation for a family get-together on one of the 15 days of the Chinese New Year. \bigotimes

A cold chill ran down my spine and I went silent with a heavy heart when she asked me how I was. The warmth of her tone recovered my composure with a thanksgiving to God that there are family members who still remember and care for each other. There are so many experiences and events that have happened over the last few years where I had missed them all because we have not been keeping in touch with our relatives and their family members.

It was then my mother added that this auntie has always enquired about me and how I was since my maternal grandmother passed on several years ago. My late grandmother took care of me in my early years and this thought opened a flood-gate of emotions drilling into memories then when I had more interactions with them as we gathered at our maternal grand-parents' home yearly during the Chinese New Year.

The sentiments grew stronger as more calls were made. It was when we heard from another uncle that he cannot make it due to family issues and medical conditions. It dawned on me that things have changed over time. I will be praying for them. I am thankful to have a family in Christ too. God as our Father in Heaven taught us that the ties that bind starts with Him.

In the New Testament, the four gospels narrated the life and death of Jesus Christ. It formed the back-drop of how Jesus came to us and the importance of His role from birth, life and death in God's plan to save us from sin; provide us an avenue with the opportunity for eternal life and salvation through Jesus Christ.

I read that the word "Gospel" is derived from the Anglo-Saxon term of Godspell, i.e. "Good Story. It was in the late 18th century, the first three gospels are known as Synoptic Gospels because the texts are written in such a way that flowed with the life and death of Jesus Christ. It was His Promise to us that He will never leave us and will always be with us when we believe and have faith in Him.

My Recent Bereavement



My dad passed away on 9 Feb 2019. Noting his advanced age of 85 years, I had been through an anguish-fraught time regarding his health and his salvation, especially since he was persistently resistant to any Christian prayer for him.

Over a period, I talked to him about the light and peace of God. I kept telling him about his good fortune to have so many children, children-inlaw, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren – 子孙满堂。Yet, I could discern that he was lacking in the inner peace despite the physical possessions he had.

On one occasion when I prayed for him, he opened his eyes. I asked him what he saw and he answered, "Light." I was not too sure what he meant by that. At that time, the room's main light was off and there was just a small light bulb nearby not directly in his line of sight. I told him that I wanted to pray for him and he answered, "No need." This was quite a softened response, different from the usual outright rejections ("Don't pray for me!").

I pleaded with God to prolong his life for me to have more time to speak with him.

On 6 Feb, daytime, I had this opportunity to be alone with him to talk about the inner peace from God. He said the following 3 times (in Hokkien) after me:

- "I want peace." (我要平安。)
- "Peace in God。" (上帝内的平安。)
- "Jesus loves Tan Leong Huat" (耶稣爱陈两发。) Amen!

He repeated 3 times that evening.

During this CNY, I would visit him every night.

On 9 Feb (Saturday), after my dialect visitation, I was beside him at about 8.30 pm when I felt that he got something to talk to me. He spoke in a feeble but calm voice. I reminded him to have the inner peace of God and to blink his eyes if he agreed with what I said. Yes, he blinked his eyes a few times in a clear receptive response to my ministering and prayer effort compared with the usual outright rejections. I prayed for the peace of God to be with him and for God to accept him into His presence if this was the right time. Shortly after, my father left us.

The timing of my father's passing on was not incidental; it was after celebrating his last CNY with all his children and grandchildren; and after God had given extended time for me and one of my sisters (who is a Christian) to minister to him. During this time, we witnessed the gradual softening of his original hard opposition to even a mere suggestion of any Christian praying for him. In his final moments, he became amiable to offers of Christian prayer and was positive towards my communication about the peace in Jesus for him to have.

At the moment of his passing, I cried but not so much as my other siblings cried, because I felt that the peace of God was with me that he is in good hands. The next day, during my QT, I was reminded of this "inner peace" when reading the passage of Scripture: "... in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble, but take heart! I have overcome the world." – John 16:33.

God gave peace – not a fickle peace; but a deep, long-lasting one. God's kingdom of shalom is with us, to be experienced as an inner peace that can't be destroyed. We experience this long-lasting peace by a relationship with God through Jesus, the Prince of shalom. (Isa 9:6)

"The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned." – Isa 9:2

The Lord re-assured me that my dad is in His loving hands. Throughout the wake, I felt the inexplicable peace of God in me. I deeply appreciate my friends/relatives and fellow brothers and sisters in Christ in JCC for the prayer support and condolences in my recent bereavement.

Listen ... stop and consider God's Wonders





(Ref. Job 37:14-16)

A brother-in-Christ sent me a video of a Mandarin duck, a flamboyant native of China and Japan which was stealing the show in Gotham Central Park. With delight, he exclaimed, "God is great! Created it with such beautiful colours.

The next day, another brother sent me the photo of a cactus in the desert with excitement: "Wow, blooming also. Won't you love it?"

Oh sure, I love it. And I love the Mandarin duck too!

Now, I have my question: In our busy life, do we ever pause to God's wonders?

In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. He created all the



colours and set them as a rainbow in the clouds.

Martin Cheah was enthusiastic to share a photo of the rainbow that appeared above Tiger Brewery. Perhaps, the reason for his enthusiasm (and it should be ours too) is that the rainbow reminds us of the everlasting covenant of grace between God

and all life on the earth. (Gen 9:13-17)

We know that life cannot exist without water and air. If there are water and air but no colours, then there would be no light also. Life wouldn't exist in such a void. Recall that when the earth was formless and empty, and darkness was over the surface of the deep, God created light (colours) before he brought life into existence. (Gen 1) Hence, it may be correct to say that life cannot exist without water, air and colours. Students of science know that water (H₂0) and air (mixture of O₂, N₂, etc.) are chemicals (with chemical names or molecular

formulas), but they usually neglect observing that colour is also ubiquitous in chemistry.

When we look at God's creation, there are 3 aspects to contemplate: the obvious, the obscure, and the invisible.

It is obvious that life cannot exist without water and air, but it is obscure to us that colours are also essential for life.

It is obvious to us that plant and animal lives thrive in visible abundance of lifegiving water, but it escapes our thought that **thorn and cactus can also become an oasis**. (Ps 68:9 MSG)

It is obvious to us the easily visible works of the LORD (Ps 104:24-25; Isa 43:20), but we are less attentive to God's invisible qualities – his eternal power and divine nature – that have been clearly seen from His creation. (Rom 1:20) It is obvious to us the usefulness of tangible things that God created, but it is obscure to our mind that beauty in itself is also God's creation for His own pleasure and for man's enjoyment.



Let us admire the beauty of the Mandarin duck's plumage, marvel at the blooming cactus in the desert, grasp the deep covenantal message of the rainbow that God set in the sky and cherish the beauty of the life-giving colours in our nature parks.

Listen ... stop and consider God's wonders. (Job 37:14-16)
