Rejoice: A Saviour Has Been Born To Us!

The annual Christmas season is here again. Although Christians celebrate Christmas with joy for the reasons they know – with the advent of the Messiah (Isa 6:3, Lk 2:13, Rev 5:11) guaranteeing the eternal destiny of universal harmony in heaven for those who believe – it is never easy to communicate the true meaning of Christmas to a world that is drowned by the holiday revelry around rampant commercialised versions that are anything but a celebration of Christ's birth.

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The following quotations (attributed to James Irwin, the pilot for Apollo 15, the 4th lunar landing in 1971)¹, should give us pause:

- "The Earth reminded us of a Christmas tree ornament hanging in the blackness of space. As we got farther and farther away it diminished in size. Finally, it shrank to the size of a marble, the most beautiful marble you can imagine. That beautiful, warm, living object looked so fragile, so delicate, that if you touched it with a finger it would crumble and fall apart. Seeing this has to change a man, has to make a man appreciate the creation of God and the love of God."
- "Being on the moon had a profound spiritual impact upon my life. Before I entered space with the Apollo 15 mission in July of 1971, I was a lukewarm Christian, to say the least! I was even a silent Christian, but I feel the Lord sent me to the moon so I could return to the earth and share his Son. Jesus Christ.

"The entire space achievement is put in proper perspective when one realizes that God walking on the earth is more important than man walking on the moon. I believe that God walked on the earth 2,000 years ago in the person of Jesus Christ. I have totally yielded my life to the Lord's service to tell people everywhere about the life-changing message of Christ."

"I felt the power of God as I'd never felt it before."

Do we all have to plan a holiday trip to the moon to feel the power of God and share the life-changing message of Christ?
